Born May 22, 1885, St. Joseph, Mo. Died Feb. 8, 1960, Boise


Married Zola Castlebury on April 10, 1915

J.D. from University of Chicago, 1909

Taught U.S. History at Boise High and served as the football coach at the school. Worthwine also coached men's and women's basketball and track at Boise High from 1911-1913.

Career Highlights:

- >> Practiced law from 1913 until 1960 in Boise.
- >> Partner at Hawley and Worthwine (1920-1940).
- >> Secretary of the Idaho State Bar in 1923.
- >> Second commander of the John Regan American Legion Post in 1919.
- >> National Vice Commander of the American Legion in 1936.
- >> President of the Boise Chamber of Commerce in 1938-41.
- >> Chairman of Boise Chamber of Commerce committee to select permanent site for Boise Junior College, now Boise State University.
- >> President of Bronco Stadium, Inc. in 1950.






Oscar Worthwine in his Idaho Building office, 1949

The University of Chicago Maroons All-Western Football Conference Fullback in 1909 (now the Big 10).

During Worthwine's career at Chicago, Amos Alonzo Stagg was his coach. In Stagg's 1927 autobiography, "Touchdown", he wrote of Worthwine, "...[he] worked his way through school, won a Phi Beta Kappa key, never missed a practice, a game, a scrimmage in three years and was never hurt."
